Médecins Sans Frontières (Doctors Without Borders) and the Veolia Foundation sign research and innovation partnership

Médecins Sans Frontières (MSF - Doctors Without Borders) and the Veolia Foundation today signed a multi-year research and innovation partnership in the fields of energy, waste, wastewater and drinking water. In particular, this partnership aims to reduce the energy footprint and optimize MSF's projects and missions, and to examine the possibility of using renewable energies, especially solar, for field facilities in order to improve their autonomy.

In addition to financial support, the Veolia Foundation will provide MSF with access to the experts in its Veoliaforce network to assist the organization with its research and innovation projects, especially in the area of energy. Veoliaforce is a network of Veolia employees from all Group businesses who wish to volunteer their technical skills and expertise for the humanitarian actions supported by the Veolia Foundation. The prime aim of Veoliaforce volunteers working on an emergency mission is to secure the health environment by proposing solutions liable to rapidly provide access to water, re-establish energy supply, remove waste, and transport food supplies and equipment.

The first area of applied and experimental research will involve the installation of photovoltaic solar panels to secure an autonomous supply of electricity for MSF's mission to combat malaria in Moissala, southern Chad.

MSF has been running a malaria prevention and treatment mission in this region since 2010, targeting in particular children under the age of five for whom this disease the leading cause of mortality. MSF provides local support for the Ministry of Health's prevention campaigns (awareness and preventive treatment) and healthcare activities (consultations in health centers and hospitalization for the most severe cases).. Because of its very isolated location, average size and geographic position (high level of sunshine), MSF selected this mission for a photovoltaic solar energy pilot project. The aim is to make the mission autonomous while also securing its electricity supply. The first step in 2015 will be set up solar panels on the site facilities which house between five and ten expatriate and local personnel, together with a significant stock of equipment and medication

"The purpose in this strategic sector is twofold. First, we wish to optimize energy management for MSF's missions and generate savings and reduce our energy footprint. Second, we are considering the use of renewable energies, especially solar, in order to improve the autonomy of our projects," explains Stéphane Roques, General Director of Médecins Sans Frontières.

For Thierry Vandevelde, General Delegate for the Veolia Foundation, "this partnership will strengthen the already positive cooperation between our two organizations. I am delighted that we are able to support MSF's search for greater autonomy for its missions and its ongoing quest for the smallest possible energy footprint. It will enable us to extend and improve the service we provide to the communities experiencing hardship that the organization helps on a daily basis."



Cooperation between the Veolia Foundation and MSF began in 2012 under a campaign to combat cholera in the Democratic Republic of Congo involving the refurbishment and extension of the drinking water network in the city of Kalemie, Katanga province. Through this cooperation, 90,000 people now have access to better quality water. The Veolia Foundation also tested and then deployed for MSF an emergency water treatment plant, called Aquaforce 500, in two camps housing more than 40,000 South Sudanese refugees in northern Uganda.
